Greetings Church Family,

Happy New Year! (Or should I say, Happy Christian New Year!) Each year our liturgical calendar concludes with Christ the King Sunday, then our new church cycle begins as we enter the Advent season. So now is the time, as Christians, to get a jump start on our resolutions!

As one of the mainline Christian denominations, United Methodists typically follow the Revised Common Lectionary, which is a three-year cycle of readings intended to navigate the major themes of the Bible in three years. This year also happens to be the beginning of a new lectionary cycle, as we once again begin our journey through the scriptures.

Throughout this Advent season we will be exploring the idea of waiting. Our faith is hopeful. We eagerly anticipate the return of our Lord, and the restoration of all God's creation. 

Church and Society

Each year, our church has a tradition of alternative gift giving at Christmas time. For several years now, the choices have been **Second Harvest Food Bank**, **NAMI**, **Heifer International**, and **Missionary Katherine Parker**. I'd like to tell you a little more about each one of these in hopes of inspiring you to take part in this holiday ritual.

This year, the <u>Second Harvest Food Bank</u> is in desperate need of your help. Because of the extended government shutdown, food banks all over the country did not receive the funding on which they depend for several weeks. At the same time there has been a sharp increase in demand. The benefits for the nearly 42 million Americans who rely on SNAP have been significantly reduced and hundreds of thousands of people will lose their benefits at the new year. Even as the temporary challenge is solved, there remain many people right here in our own community who will continue to need our help. Second Harvest Food Bank helps to feed 500,000 clients every month. However, with less Federal funding and increased demand, you can see how important your donation would be.



<u>NAMI</u>, National Alliance on Mental Illness, is dedicated to building better lives for the millions of Americans affected by mental illness. The Alliance includes more than 650 NAMI State Organizations and Affiliates who work in your community to raise awareness and provide support and education to those in need. However, much of the funding for all of this has been drastically cut by the present administration.

The United States is meanwhile in the midst of an ongoing mental health, overdose, and suicide crisis, one of the most widespread and enduring public health challenges of our time. More than 84 million adults, and millions of children and teens, live with mental health or substance use conditions that affect people in every community, across every background and belief. We are not immune to this within our own church community. We all know those who have family members in crisis. NAMI works to save lives and help families. *A contribution to this cause will make a difference!*



Heifer International is a non-profit organization that works to end hunger and poverty by providing farmers with livestock, training, and resources to build sustainable livelihoods. Founded in 1944, it has helped over 39 million people by empowering them with the tools to become self-sufficient and break the cycle of poverty.

Heifer provides animals like goats or cows, along with training on animal care and sustainable agriculture practices. Families can then move from poverty to self-sufficiency, generate income, put food on the table, and send their children to school. Through its programs, Heifer helps farmers connect with each other and form cooperatives, sharing knowledge and resources to help entire communities thrive. A donation to this organization is a popular one to give in honor of a child you know and love.



Missionary Katherine Parker is a missionary with the General Board of Global Ministries of The United Methodist Church serving as a Health and Community Transformation Advisor with the United Mission to Nepal (UMN). The Methodist Church has supported the UMN since its founding 65 years ago.

Katherine was previously based in one of UMN's field offices in western Nepal and now works in participatory research across the organization from a base in Kathmandu, where she is also a part of the UMN leadership team.

Our church has been supporting Katherine's work in Nepal for many years, starting with when Anne and David Scott joined our church and brought her work to our attention. In fact we have a covenant relationship with Katherine Parker to send at least \$1000 every year to support her work. She has visited our congregation several times to speak about her work in that part of the world. *A donation to Missionary Katherine Parker will help us meet our goal*.



Alternative Christmas giving is available through December 21. In-person giving is available after worship on December 7, 14, and 21. Online giving is available by clicking here.

As we go into the new year, there will be several possibilities for doing mission work. Aptos UMC at times prepares meals for the unhoused community; we support the work of the Mid-County Homeless Coalition, providing showers for the unhoused, by attending the February Chili Cook Off; we joyfully support Santa Cruz Pride by co-sponsoring a table at the Pride Parade in June; we have historically supported the work of Habitat for Humanity, and will do so again when there is a build nearby. In November, I invited folks to consider running a pet ministry at our church. If you would be interested in organizing that, let me know. It could be a support group for those who have recently lost a beloved pet or a pet visit for a shut-in member.

Additionally, our church provides space to the Aptos group of Village Santa Cruz, an organization dedicated to helping seniors in the community maintain their independence. That group will next meet at 1 PM on December 3, 2025 and again on January 7, 2026 at our church. You are welcome to join if you are interested.

May everyone have a blessed holiday and plenty of optimism in the new year due to your faith and hope in the Lord!


