Greetings Church Family,

I'm reminded lately of the hymn, "How Can I Keep from Singing?". Life keeps moving along, often in ways we would not choose. Yet we are constantly choosing how we respond, even as we ourselves are caught up in that movement.

Sometimes there's nothing left to do but sing. The Methodist movement was born in song. We sing our faith, and our songs are about calling out to God. Last month we turned to the songbook that has sustained and defined the people of God from the very beginning. The Psalms give words to a variety of emotions and circumstances out of which we call upon the Lord. We shape our worship around these words to give voice to people in our communities who may feel unheard even by God. The witness of the Psalms is that God is prepared to meet us where we are.

So where are we? Are we singing the divine song God has placed in our hearts? Or a song that rises from the depths of our humanity? To reframe the question: Is faith a gift or a choice? Is it something God does in us or something we do for God?

The answer is a resounding "Yes!". Faith is a mixture of all that and more. It's a partnership with God as we enter into relationship, for our good, and for the good of the world around us. We are choosing every day to live by our faith, to be shaped by our faith, and to submit all our actions and relationships to the measure of faith. In the next month we will be returning to the great Gospel of Luke to explore Jesus' teachings on what it means to be a people of faith.

I pray that you will experience the peace of God, the love of Christ, and the song of the Spirit.

Church and Society

"Let justice roll on like a river, righteousness like a never-failing stream!"

Amos 5:24

There are many of us in our church community who are wrestling with how to respond to the daily news of policies now being implemented that are tearing down protections for vulnerable peoples, for the environment, for the health and education of our society's children, and for the freedom to express our objections to these cancellations of programs that we thought were well established and irrevocable.

Though, as people of faith, we try to listen to the reasoning offered by those who celebrate these societal changes, the rhetoric is often inflammatory and difficult to counter in a reasonable way. Yet, prayerfully, we persist, asking the Lord to give us hope, to help us to keep our faith strong, and to give us the strength and courage to act in ways that will ultimately be effective.

In June 2025, the 175th California-Nevada Annual Conference Session of the United Methodist Church met in Sacramento. The theme of the conference was "Witnesses of a New Thing" and centered on keeping hope in the struggle and learning to listen to and communicate with those opposed to us. Conference Lay Leader Michael Pope called out, "Social justice action is God's work. We need to pivot to another way of being with each other! We have to change and create pathways and bridges. . .be willing to embrace something we don't know what it is. Get out there, the world is waiting for you!"

When facing government repression, maintaining hope requires a combination of personal psychological resilience, community building, and strategic, nonviolent action. Activists and citizens in such circumstances often focus on protecting their communities, publicizing the truth, and envisioning a positive future to fuel their resolve. Here are some ideas for us when we are feeling overwhelmed:

Focus on what you can control. The Serenity Prayer, adapted during the rise of Nazism, highlights the wisdom of accepting what you cannot change, having the courage to change what you can, and knowing the difference. This helps prevent emotional exhaustion.

Build a strong community. Authoritarian tactics aim to isolate individuals. Actively seek out and build trusted relationships with others who share your values. This collective effort provides safety, emotional support, and a broader base for resistance.

Engage in "grounding" and healing work. Finding stability in daily life can provide a strong foundation for continued resistance. This can include activities like gardening, cultural work, and different ways of caring for one another.

Celebrate small victories. Acknowledge and celebrate small wins to sustain morale. For example, celebrating those who take a courageous stand, even if they face punishment, can inspire others.

One such person taking a stand in Florida is the Rev. Andy Oliver, pastor of Allendale UMC in St. Petersburg, FL (pictured at right in the center in the black t-shirt). On August 29, Oliver was arrested and charged with misdemeanor obstruction for kneeling on a Black History Matters mural to protest efforts by the Florida Department of Transportation to remove it. The mural was near the Woodson African American Museum of Florida. "I showed up there because I felt called to put my body in the way of something really horrific happening," Oliver said. "It wasn't just erasing a mural. It was a whole people feeling like their culture, their very essence, was being erased."

Oliver spent the night in jail. He could get a year in jail on the obstruction charges, which he is fighting with the help of a state Representative. Nevertheless, he says, "I will always do what it takes to show up. Because that's what Jesus did, right? Keep pushing."

So, let us stay the course, remembering: "Learn to do right; seek justice. Defend the oppressed." Isaiah 1:17 And the Lord will be with you.


